Bionote

Simon's Ph.D. work was on the role of customary marine tenure and local ecological knowledge in near-shore fishery management in Nggela, Solomon Islands. This cross-disciplinary study involved fisheries stock assessments and long-term village-based ethnographic research. Since then he has maintained a keen interest in understanding how coastal fishers think about their impacts on fishery dynamics. Simon has worked on a broad range of projects, including biodiversity conservation, the social and economic impact of mining, agricultural and fishery resource management on small, densely populated islands, and the resilience of coastal fisheries to varying levels of fishing pressure and modes of management. Most of this work has been located in PNG and Solomon Islands, with recent participation in two agricultural projects in Laos (ASEM-2011-075; ASEM-2012-073).

Simon recently scripted a fisheries education video called 'Fish and People' (http://www.ecomedia.com.au/fishandpeople.html) which, although designed for Melanesian high school audiences, is already proving to be popular in a number of countries outside of Melanesia as well. He has authored or co-authored 40 journal articles, 5 book chapters, 19 consultancy reports or working papers and a set of educational booklets on the environmental impacts of mining. Simon started teaching anthropology (environmental anthropology, and the anthropology of development) at JCU in 2012. He currently supervises 8 Ph.D. students and one honours student.
